Young People

It's that time of year again when many efforts are being made to keep our young people occupied – not simply to keep them out of trouble, but to remind them to keep the important thing the important thing. Families arrange for them to attend summer camps with other young people who are Christians (or counselors who are).

And churches get involved by hosting Vacation Bible Schools (ours is July 18-22, don't forget!) and Youth Lecture Weekends (ours is July 30-31, don't forget!). In addition, we are offering special classes on Wednesday evenings for our

young men and young women (in the months of June and July) on the critical topic of Acting Like Men (or Women).

So, whether individually or congregationally, a great deal of effort is being placed into our young people during these summer months – as we do pretty much every summer.

But why? Why all the 'fuss' over our young people? Are summer camps and VBS programs simply baby-sitting services to give mom and dad a break? Of course not. We put so much effort into our young people because those young years are the

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most formative years of a person's life. That's true physically, mentally and spiritually. It's not that Satan doesn't try to bring us all down. He does. But if he can turn a young person away from God before he or she even starts the race, the odds are he will have them for eternity. The percentage (by age group) of those who become Christians declines dramatically with each passing decade. Most who become Christians do so early in life. Those who are converted later in life do exist; but statistically the numbers favor the young.

No wonder Moses admonished parents to "teach them diligently" (De 6:7). No wonder Solomon warned young people to "remember your Creator in the days of your youth" (Ec 12:1). And no wonder Paul reminded Christian fathers to bring up their children "in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" (Ep 6:4). And to young people directly Paul wrote, "Let no one despise you for your youth, but set the believers an example in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith,

in purity" (1 Ti 4:12). God cares about young people; and God's people should, too.

It is true that we (young and old) are all one in Christ. It is true that Satan uses the same avenues of temptation to lure the old as he does the young (lust of the flesh, lust of the eyes, pride of life). And it is true that we are all accountable to God for the choices we make.

But Paul warned Timothy to "flee youthful lusts" (2 Ti 2:22), which acknowledges that some temptations are stronger for the young than for those who are not. We need to acknowledge that fact as well, and be there for our young people as they navigate what is perhaps the most challenging time of their life. To neglect them now is to do them, and God's kingdom, an eternal disservice.

It has been said that our young people are the church of tomorrow. But there is no reason they cannot be the church of **today** – if we will be diligent in pointing them to heaven.
