

Keep On Keeping On

Few joys in life compare to seeing one's child – or grandchild – being baptized into Christ. Becoming a Christian is the most important decision anyone can make in life. No other comes close because this decision, more than any other, sets the stage for eternity.

And what we want for our children and grandchildren – and for all who have come to Christ – is that they remain faithful until death. Ending the race before it is finished is a monumental defeat – again, because of the eternal ramifications. But how does one keep on keeping on? How does one manage to grow as a Christian when so much of the world seeks to destroy us?

The answer is actually very simple. Just as in the physical realm, certain elements are necessary to sustain life, so also in the spiritual realm the same elements are necessary. The author of Hebrews (a book written to Christians who were on the verge of giving up) identifies what those elements are, and more – if we have the wisdom to follow his inspired advice. "For though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you again the basic principles of the oracles of God. You need milk, not solid food; for everyone who lives on milk is unskilled in the word of righteousness, since he is a child. But solid food is for the mature, for those who have their powers of discernment trained by constant practice to distinguish good from evil." He 5:12-14

Notice the three elements. First, growth requires time. It is easy to become impatient, especially when we first begin the race. So be patient (He 10:35-37). Later, when the new wears off, the religion of Christ can become stale, and we can grow lukewarm in our love for Him. We need to maintain our zeal (Re 3:19). And with time comes temptation - the temptations of youth when we are young, the temptations of worldly cares when we are middle-aged, and the common discouragements of old age, if we live that long. Using our time to grow spiritually stronger is vital if we would overcome (Ep 6:10-18).

The second element mentioned by the Hebrews author is proper **diet**. To become a Christian one must have a basic knowledge of God's Word and His plan of salvation. But we must continue to grow beyond that basic understanding. Milk is important at first (1 Pe 2:2), but a growing person needs solid food to thrive. So spend time with God's Word. Read it, and take advantage of opportunities (like our Bible classes) to learn more of it. And stay away from junk food – human wisdom, philosophy, etc.

And finally, we must **exercise**. Use the energy you gain from a good spiritual diet to be productive in God's kingdom. Be an encourager to God's people. Be a light to the community (Mt 5:16) by the way you live your life – the way you dress, the way you talk, and the way you act. Talk up your faith every chance you get. And never look back. Your home awaits – if you will keep on keeping on!
