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Parachutes & Purgatory

'If at first you don't succeed, don't try skydiving.' Now, **that's** sound advice. After all, some things you only get one chance at.

The doctrine of purgatory argues that we **do** get a second chance. If the parachute doesn't open, it's okay — you may get bruised and battered, but you'll eventually heal. The only problem is, such a doctrine defies the laws of nature **and** the laws of God. The Bible says nothing of a 'place of purging'; instead, it teaches the permanence of our eternal condition (Lu 16:19-31).

One chance means we **must** get it right the first time. It means we **must** do our due diligence. Is the plane airworthy? Is the Pilot really qualified? Is the parachute packed properly? Is it fitted right? These are just a few of the questions a skydiver had better take seriously. After all, his or her life depends on it.

Some see no point in jumping out of a perfectly good plane; but jump you will, one day (He 9:27). The only question is whether you land safely – or in eternal splatter. So, check your chute! - WKing

Another Perspective

What is a 'Miracle'?

Be careful with the word 'miracle'!

I see increasing numbers of references among disciples of Christ referring to events in their lives as miraculous, or even asking for a miracle. Perhaps it's time for a reminder that we don't live in the miraculous age. That fact almost used to be taken for granted in congregations I know and perhaps for that reason many have neglected teaching on it; therefore, we increasingly see loose usage of the word. It may be a result of the influence of postmodernism and its emphasis on feelings over reason.

By definition, a miracle involves an act or process that violates the laws of nature – in many cases the instant healing of permanent and visible defects (John 11; Acts 3:2; 13; Jn. 9, etc). Sometimes miracles were supernatural signs such as walking on water, turning water to wine, feeding the 5,000, etc.

But something that is marvelous is not necessarily a miracle. The design of our body – and especially our brain – with the amazing ability to fight disease, give birth and invent medicines, is a work of God that shows His infinite intelligence. But the wonderful function of our bodies is not a miracle in the Biblical sense.

The danger in applying the term 'miracle' to what is not truly miraculous is a cheapening of the concept. If we apply the word to gradually getting better from an illness or to having a tumor shrink with treatment, unbelievers will begin to see 'miracles' as no big deal, but something that commonly happens among nonbelievers as well as believers. We don't want to cheapen the impact of the true miracles of Jesus and the apostles! Therefore, let's be discreet and avoid applying that word so loosely.
