The cares of this world can often be overwhelming. It's easy to get down when we turn on the news and hear about disease, corruption, injustice, or unrest. For the unbeliever, these things may seem to be what makes up a large portion of our existence. If one doesn't believe in life after death, then this is as good as it gets. As Christians though, we understand that this world is not our home, and we are just pilgrims traveling towards an eternal destination. Still, we are faced with extreme temptation to act like the rest of the world, to act as if this world IS our home, that our political situation is paramount, that death is a tragedy instead of a victory, or that thinking that we are right about something gives us permission to be rude.

The sanctity, sainthood, or set apart nature that should make us different from the world is a central theme in the Bible's description of Christian living. Most of Paul's epistles are addressed to "the sanctified" or those "called to be saints" (i.e., 1 Co 1:2). Peter addresses his letters to the "pilgrims" and those "having escaped the depravity in the world". 1 Peter 2:9 describes Christians as "a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people". What if God's special people didn't act so special? What if we were too busy being "entangled in the affairs of this life" to be any different than the world around us (2 Ti 2:4)?

As we go out into the world this week, let's remember who we are called to be — who we are!

So, whatever we may do in service of God and His kingdom, let us do it with all our might, for we are all valued and loved servants — no matter how small our job may be.
