Ebenezer

This time of year it always seems natural to be thinking about Ebenezer (no, not Scroogel). Remember the story? Samuel became a judge of Israel when the nation was corrupt and idolatrous. Because of this, they were slaughtered in battle with the Philistines.

During the first battle, the Philistines killed four thousand Israelites. The Israelites decided maybe if they marched the Ark of the Covenant into battle with them, that the Ark could save them from their enemies (1 Sa 4:3)! The presence of the Ark certainly boosted the morale of the army — "all Israel shouted so loudly that the earth shook" (4:5)! Yet the Philistines were courageous, and after the second battle thirty thousand Israelites lay dead and the Ark of the Covenant was captured (4:10-11).

The Philistines soon returned the Ark, however, along with some extra gold, because God afflicted every city where the Ark was taken with tumors. When the Ark was returned, the Israelites didn't really know what to do with it.

Samuel taught them that if they repented and sought God's help, He would deliver the Philistines onto their hands. At the next battle, they asked Samuel not to "cease from crying out to the Lord for us" (7:8). God confused the enemy with loud thunder and the Philistines were overwhelmed. Samuel then raised a stone as a memorial, and he called it Ebenezer, which means "stone of help".

As we look back at the battles of our year, may we call to mind the words of the old hymn: "Here I raise my Ebenezer, hither by Thy help I've come." For, "thus far the Lord has helped us" (7:17).
