Dying Wishes

Over the course of his life, John Quincy Adams amassed a collection of over six thousand books! His dying wish was that a stone structure be erected to house his library in a building that would not be susceptible to fire. Adams believed that the preservation of his books was a way of keeping his legacy alive. This wish is meaningful, but its consequence pales in comparison to these dying wishes in the Bible.

Peter was prepared for his martyrdom by Christ (Jn 21:19). He spent his life from that point forward with the understanding that he would be put to death for the sake of the gospel. Near the end of his life, Peter wrote to Christians encouraging them to "make their call and election sure" (2 Pe 1:10), a concept he must have held as highly important at this late stage in his life.

To do this, Peter urged his brethren to return to the basics of the faith. "I will remind you of these things, though you know and are established in the present truth. Yes, I think it is right, as long as I am in this tent, to stir you up by reminding you, knowing that shortly I must put off my tent..." (2 Pe 1:12-14). Peter's concern at the end of his life was not his own legacy, but the continued faithfulness of his brethren.

Likewise, Paul at the end of his life wrote to young Timothy: "I remind you to stir up the gift of God which is in you" (2 Ti 1:6). Paul's concern was that the gospel continue to be preached, so that when others' departures were "at hand", they too could say, "I have fought the good fight!"

Put On Your Grownup Pants

"If at first you don't succeed, destroy all evidence that you tried." It's how some folks deal with failure. They 'destroy the evidence' by running away (as the Jews who fled to Egypt during the Babylonian captivity, Jer 41), or by blaming others (as King Saul, 1 Sa 15), or by adopting a posture of self-denial (as those of Laodicea, Re 3). All failed spiritually; and all attempted to escape their failures – without success.

The sad fact is, we have **all** failed spiritually (Ro 3:23). And while we may think we can sweep those

failures under the rug (in various ways), that is **not** how God wants us to deal with our sins. He wants to forgive us; but that only happens when we put on our 'grownup pants', own up to our sins, and confess them (1 Jn 1:8-10).

The parable of the prodigal son (Lu 15) is still one of my favorites. How perfectly it describes our condition (at some point). How perfectly it describes a right response. And how perfectly it describes God's willingness to forgive – if we will come to Him on His terms. - WKing
