# Their Reward

When we observe the world, it is easy to identify people who make a big show of their religion. Many people of the world would like to be seen as religious outwardly but are not willing to make the commitment to be Christlike inwardly. Of course, such are playing the hypocrite – trying to appear one way while behaving in another. Yet somehow these people often tend to get the recognition they desire.

Jesus described this concept in His sermon on the mount. "When you do a charitable deed, do not sound a trumpet before you as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may have glory from men. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward" (Mt. 6:2). "When you pray, you shall not be like the hypocrites. For they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the corners of the streets, that they may be seen by men. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward" (Mt. 6:5). "When you fast, do not be like the hypocrites, with a sad countenance. For they disfigure their faces that they may appear to men to be fasting. Assuredly, I say to you, they have their reward" (Mt. 6:16).

What are your goals in your personal religion? Are they just to feel good about yourself, to enhance your social status, or to appear holy and righteous to other people? If these are your goals, Jesus said "you have your reward"! If outward religion is your thing, these goals can be easily attained!

However, if you are interested in the real purpose of charity, prayer and fasting – the pursual of a relationship with God – you must leave behind these concerns of the world. Do good in secret, pray alone in your room, and fast with joy, and "He who sees in secret will reward you" (Mt 6:4, 6, 18)!

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### Why Not Fry Them?

"Do all things without complaining and disputing" (Ph 2:14), which is simple enough – until we decide to make an exception for ourselves.

For example, "do all things without complaining and disputing" – unless mom and dad are driving home from the morning worship. Then it's okay to malign the brothers and sisters in Christ over matters of opinion – with the kids in the back seat. Years later they wonder why the kids fell away from the Lord – or never came to Him at all.

"Do all things without complaining," unless we are on social media. Then it's okay to blast members of the church in front of the whole world over disagreements in matters of judgment. When an apostate comments, "Yeah, that's why I left the church," we are oblivious to the fact that our complaining has contributed to their apostasy.

Christians – including preachers and elders – do not always get it right. But other solutions are available to address true concerns – like limiting grievances to a 'need-to-know' audience (Mt 18:15-17) or taking them to someone with the authority to fix it (1 Co 1:11). But frying the elders or preacher or other good-hearted brethren is not a solution.
