I am **not** one of the quiet people. I never have been. By the grace of God, I am a writer, and like all gifted writers, I have a unique authorial voice. People with voices are not quiet. But the quiet people have always been my brethren and my friends. In addition to their other virtues, they are generally supportive of preachers.

Since my diagnosis (with ALS, wk), though, my relationship with the quiet people has changed. Now I have been added to the list of those for whom they care. In person, they look after me and mine. They might take the kids for a day, or mow the lawn, or bring a meal by.

When distant from me, they continue to care as best they can. They pray. They leave supportive comments on Facebook. They send cards. They send money. Some might put their money where their mouth is – the quiet people put their money where their hearts are.

I must rejoice in the wisdom of the generous. They have chosen to lay up treasure in heaven – to trust in the ancient promise that God will care for those who care for others.

We often say that the church is people. I will go one step further. The church is the quiet people. The preachers and teachers may be noisier, but they are not nearly so numerous. Mostly, the Restoration project has produced the quiet people. The work of the Holy Spirit in creating them cannot be denied.

For this reason, it makes me angry when I see "the Church of Christ" attacked online. Allegedly, "we" are legalistic, hardhearted, emotionless, unloving, etc. Because the quiet people are the church, this is an attack on them.

Frankly, I think the real issue is that the quiet people have a PR problem. They do not sound a trumpet before them as they go to do good, so church critics leap to the conclusion that no good is being done. It is shockingly imperceptive and unfair.

Let us celebrate the quiet people instead. Let us celebrate the cleansed and sanctified church in which they congregate. God does – and who are we to judge more harshly than He?

# The Clown Bank Robber

"The wicked flee when no one pursues..." (Pr 28:1).

I have always found this proverb to be somewhat humorous. It conjures up images of the dumb bank robber who has 'gotten away with it' but doesn't know it yet. So, he constantly looks over his shoulder or drives fast in the getaway car. Or he overthinks his coverup – from the nervous twitch, to the overly-detailed explanation of his whereabouts, to his over-the-top angry reaction at being questioned. And quite often, it is that very effort to disguise his guilt that gives him away.

And Christians are not exempt from this truism. God's people are not to live in sin (1 Jn 1), but we do sin. The honest heart will acknowledge that sin, ask for forgiveness, and strive to avoid such behavior in the future (Ja 5:16).

The Pharisee, by contrast, will become indignant at any suggestion that they are not what God would have them to be. They will push back against any such suggestion (Jn 8:44-48) – sometimes in violent ways (Mk 11:15-18).

The remainder of the proverb is also interesting: "... but the righteous are bold as a lion." The boldness of the righteous does not come from an overly inflated ego. It comes from the calm assurance that God knows the truth – and that He will adjudicate every cause in His time. It's the difference between the boldness of David and Goliath. Both were confident in their cause – and in their ability to sustain it. But one's confidence was founded in his own strength, while the other rested in the strength of God.

The bank robber, in his ego, believes he can get away with his crime. But he fails to calculate the omniscience of God – and becomes a foolish clown in the process. God's people know better.
