
Another Perspective

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"No Politics Shall Enter Here"

So the sign read in the courtroom chambers where Judge Isaac Parker conducted trials in Fort Smith in the latter part of the 19th century. It was his way of telling everyone that his courtroom would be fair – not tainted with bribes, favors, and "good-old-boy" preferences. Politicians, judges, and others today can learn a lesson from his approach.

And so can the church.

The Mosaic Law placed a heavy emphasis on the integrity of judges among God's people. "Look for able men from all the people, men who fear God, who are trustworthy and hate a bribe, and place such men over the people" (Ex 18:21). "You shall appoint judges... and they shall judge the people with righteous judgment. You shall not pervert justice; you shall not show partiality" (De 16:18-19).

Honor mattered then, and it matters now. "Judge with righteous judgment," Jesus said (Jn 7:24). This simple command still has profound implications for elders who shepherd the flock (Ac 20:28), and for deacons and preachers in their roles (Ac 6: 2-3, 1 Ti 5:21). And so it does for all of God's people.
